Founded in 1855, the core mission of the university is to promote learning in the Jesuit Catholic tradition. The university offers undergraduate, graduate, and professional students the knowledge and skills needed to succeed as persons and professionals, and the values and sensitivity necessary to be men and women for others.

The university will distinguish itself as a diverse, socially responsible learning community of high quality scholarship and academic rigor sustained by a faith that does justice. The university will draw from the cultural, intellectual, and economic resources of the San Francisco Bay Area and its location on the Pacific Rim to enrich and strengthen its educational programs.

Our 55-acre campus sits atop a hill next to Golden Gate Park, overlooking downtown San Francisco and the Pacific Ocean. We offer over 100 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. Our ever-expanding network of 109,203 alumni live in all 50 states, six US territories, and 135 countries.

Faculty

USF employs over 493 full-time faculty members, who are joined by several hundred part-time faculty members with specialized expertise in their disciplines. 93 percent of our full-time faculty hold the highest or terminal degree in their academic discipline (e.g., PhD, EdD, JD, MFA).

Retention Rates and Graduation Data

For the freshman class entering in the fall of 2015, the freshman-to-sophomore retention rate was 85.8%. The six-year graduation rate for Full-Time First-Time freshmen entering in fall **2010** was 71.2% and the 4-year graduation rate for the same group was 61.2%. (IPEDS, Feb 2017 prelim).

Undergraduate Financial Aid

- 72.1% of all degree seeking undergraduates were awarded some type financial aid;
- 24.7% were awarded Pell Grants;
- Average amount of all aid awarded was \$36,152;
- 25.8% of full-time, first-time freshman students were awarded Pell Grants;
- 82.3% were awarded institutional grants averaging \$24,117;
- 82.9% were awarded some type financial aid.
